




## Caid College of Heraldry

#### Altavia, Barony of

**Leonor de Sevilla.** New Device. *Argent, an antelope rampant to sinister azure within a bordure engrailed purpure.*  
[Name] Submitter's name was on the December 2009 LoI.

**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

#### Angels, Barony of the

**Ysenda MacLaran of Perthshire.** New Name and New Device. *Per saltire purpure and argent, a saltire vert between two mullets of twelve points and two natural sea horses respectant counterchanged.*

[Name] Submitter allows minor changes, cares about the meaning and language culture listed as Scottish. Submitter desires an authentic name for 13-14 century Scotland caring about the language, culture and time period.

**Ysenda** is found dated to 1208 in "A List of Feminine Personal Names Found in Scottish Records Part One: Introduction" by Talan Gwynek (Brian M. Scott), <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/scottishfem.html>  
Ysenda c.1208 [GASK, 291]

**MacLaren** is the header spelling in Black pg 534. The desired spelling is documented: Laran McLaran, 1592, where he was charged with robbery and violence in the lands of Drumquhassil (Register of the Privy Council of Scotland (1545-1625)v,p.28)(lxix)

**of Perthshire** –Perthshire is also found in Black pg 534 dated to 1296 "Lorn de Ardebethy of *Perthshire* rendered homage in 1296, (BAIN, Calendar of documents relating to Scotland preserved in Public Record Office edited by Joseph Bain 1881 )pg lix)

**Perth** is also found in Johnston, Place-Names of Scotland pg 272 as the header spelling dated to 1150,1220 & 1527 also know as St Johnstoun . *perth*, t'hicket,' Gaul. *perta*, 'a wood'

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel**

#### Calafia, Barony of

**Áengus mac Bruide.** New Name and New Device. *Per pale, azure and sable a base argent and a spear throughout argent and sable.*

[Name] Submitter will accept minor but not major changes, desires a masculine name and cares most about the unspecified language/culture.

Submitted as Áengus mac Bruide, the submission was changed to match the available documentation.

**Áengus** is found 191 times in Most Popular Men's Names in Early Medieval Ireland as the second most common given name. <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/irish100.html>

**Bruide** is a Pictish name, in **A Consideration of Pictish Names** by Tangwystyl verch Morgant on the St Gabriel site <http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/tangwystyl/pictnames/pict5.html#section5> where it is cited as one of the top 10 most popular names of the historic period.

Per precedent: From Sept 08 Loar in the return of Bran na torcdubh mac Bruide:

*mac Bruide is not grammatically correct; following mac, Bruide needs to be put into the genitive case, e.g., mac Bruide.*

There exist several historical Angus Bruide, and Angus MacBruide, illustrator of many of the Osprey books, and a king Angus Bruide, king of the pict's 724, These are probably not sufficiently important to protect.  
[Armory] The spear needs to be fed.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel with a request for consideration.**

**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel**

**Alusdar O Dane.** New Name and New Device. *Sable, a lotus blossom in profile Or between three spears in annulo argent.*

[Name] Submitted as Alusdar O'dane. The name was changed to match the available documentation. The submitter is interested in a masculine name. He accepts all changes and if the name must be changed he cares most about the unspecified sound.

**Alusdar** is found on p. 21 of OCM. It is also found at Index of Names in Irish Annals: Eoin, by Mari Elspeth nic Bryan (Kathleen M. O'Brien)

<http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/mari/AnnalsIndex/Masculine/Eoin.shtml>, which dates Alusdar mac Eoin Chathánaigh to 1499

**O Dane** is found in R&W on p. 125 (s.n. Dane). O Dane is the third of the undated header spellings under Óðeaghain in Woulfe p. 495, with the comment that it is found at the end of the 16<sup>th</sup> century in many parts of the south of Ireland and also in Donegal. (O) Dane is a head spelling in MacLysaght, p. 74, undated. O Dane is also found in

16th & 17th Century Anglicized Irish Surnames from Woulfe, by Mari Elspeth nic Bryan (Kathleen M. O'Brien) as an Anglicized Irish spelling.

[Armory] The lotus is well drawn. Blazoning the spears may be problematic as there was some discussion about using "in triangle inverted" rather than "in annulo", so assistance from the college is requested.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel**

**Arnkell inn eyverski Sigurðarson.** New Name and New Device. *Vert, two hounds rampant addorsed regardant coward in base the Roman numerals XXIX argent, a bordure Or.*

[Name] The submitter desires a masculine name. He will not accept major changes; no other preferences are indicated. Note: the submission form shows the name in all capitals.

**Arnkell** is found as a masculine name in Gierr Basse p.7

**inn eyverski** means 'man from the Orkney Islands found in Gierr Basse p.21.

**Sigurðarson Sigurðr** is found as a masculine in Gierr Basse p. 14

The letters are all in capital on the submission forms, so they have been changed to match the SCA standard.

The patronymic is formed according to the practices, and is cited as one of the examples in Gierr Bassi on page 17.

[Armory] there are has several problems – the beasts are not recognizable as hounds rather than cats or lions, the "XXIX" needs to be lower, possibly larger and more distinct, and the bordure needs to be more stout.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Device is returned for additional consultation.**

**Ayla Zengerlin.** New Name.

[Name] Submitter allows minor changes and desires a feminine name.

**Ayla** is a feminine German given name found in 15th-Century German Women's Name by Brian Scott (Talan Gwynek) <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/germ15f.html>

**Zengerlin** is found as a German surname in Bahlow 3<sup>rd</sup> ed. pg 567 under the header **Zanger** UGer from MHG zanger, zenger 'cheerful, lively, energetic' (originally 'biting and sharp') Jacob Zengerlin, Allgäu, 1250

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Claude Laudin.** New Name and New Device. *Or, a rose and on a chief invected vert three compass stars Or.*

[Name] The submitter has indicated no preferences.

**Claude** is a masculine name found in "Names Found in Commercial Documents from Bordeaux, 1470-1520" by Aryanhwy merch Catmael at <http://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/french/bordeaux.html>. It is also found in "Names from a 1587 Tax Roll from Provins" by Aryanhwy merch Catmael at <http://heraldry.sca.org/names/french/provins1587.html>.

**Laudin** is found in "Names from a 1587 Tax Roll from Provins" by Aryanhwy merch Catmael at <http://heraldry.sca.org/names/french/provins1587.html>.

Both elements are found in the single citation of Claude Laudin, in "Names from a 1587 Tax Roll from Provins" the college does not feel that he is deserving of protection.

[Armory] The use of compass stars is a step from period practice.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**  
**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Drest nepos Morleo.** New Name and New Device. *Purpure, a cat's eye Or irised purpure.*

[Name] The submitter has indicated no preferences.

**Drest** is found in Tangwystyl verch Morgant Glasvryn, "Consideration of Pictish Names, Masculine Given Names", <http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/tangwystyl/pictnames/pict2.html>

**nepos** is found in the same source; it is the Pictish naming convention to denote a relation meaning "nephew of".

**Morleo** is found in the same source as a masculine given name.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**  
**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Emma fille de Michele.** New Name and New Device. *Vert, three lizards tergiant conjoined in annulo argent.*

[Name] Submitter desires a feminine name, will accept minor, but not major changes, and cares most about the unspecified meaning.

Submitted as Emma filles de Michele, the name was changed to match the expected construction.

Emma is found as a feminine name from late 11th- and early 12th-century Latin documents in and around Normandy on the St. Gabriel site at: <http://www.panix.com/~gabriel/public-bin/showfinal.cgi/3009.txt>

**fille de** is a standard French designator meaning: daughter of

**Michele** is found in Basque Onomastics of the Eighth to Sixteenth Centuries, at [http://www.larsdatter.com/basque/Mikel\(m\)fromtheHebrewMiykael\(whoislikeGod?\)LatinizedasMichaelus](http://www.larsdatter.com/basque/Mikel(m)fromtheHebrewMiykael(whoislikeGod?)LatinizedasMichaelus)

Vars: Michele. 13<sup>th</sup> century. [ARZA s.m. izur; JLIR 253]

This would combine French with Basque, for which there is no precedent, but would likely be at most one step from period practice.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**  
**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Garrett de Haviland.** New Name and New Device. *Sable, in fess two annulets conjoined between three scorpions argent.*

[Name] The submitter desires a masculine name, will accept all changes, and if the name must be changed he cares most about unspecified sound.

Name submitted as Garrett Du Haviland. As all of the other forms had *du* in lower case, we have changed the name to Garrett de Haviland to match the documentation.

**Garrett** is found in Withycombe p. 131 s.n. Gerard, dated in this spelling to 16<sup>th</sup> century Royal Accounts.

**de Haviland** is found in R&W p. 21 as a header spelling. Haviland is found in this spelling with several citations on Ancestry.com: Matthew Haviland of Bristol, 11 Dec 1603 (Somerset, England, Extracted Parish Records, Burial); Matthew Haviland, 22 May 1620 (Gloucestershire, England Extracted Parish Records, St. Warborowes); James Haviland, 19 Aug 1633 (Dorset, England, Extracted Parish Records, Marriages); and Elizab: haviland 16 June 1639 (Dorset, England, Extracted Parish Records, Christenings).

[Armory] Note to artist: scorpions need to be drawn larger. Annulets should be round.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**  
**Device is approved and forwarded Laurel.**

**Garrett de Haviland.** New Household Name *El Grotto* and New Household Badge. *Sable, in base a flame per fess Or and gules charged with a flame sable, a chief azure semy of mullets of four points argent.*

[Name] The submitter's name appears above. The submitter cares most about the meaning, a grotto. No other preferences indicated.

The name has no documentation and no designator, therefore must be returned. Casa del Grotto might be a registerable household name with documentation for the use of Grotto.

[Armory] The badge is submitted on the wrong form. The flame is no longer an acceptable style, the internal detail in black, and the gradient color is the problem, the shape is fine. A chief cannot be color on color. The charges in the same need to be larger and more evenly distributed.

**Name is returned for lack of documentation.**  
**Badge is returned for several problems.**

**Kitta Freyviðardottir.** New Device. *Argent, two domestic cats sejant erect addorsed tails entwined sable, a chief per pale vert and azure.*

[Name] The submitter's name appears on Caid's January 2010 LoI.

**Device is approved and forwarded Laurel.**

**Rannveig Snorraddottir** Resub Name Change

[Name] Name registered: Megwynne Seonaid of Loch Lomand June 1988.

Name change to Rannveig Sundfyllir was returned by Laurel February 2004: This name is being returned for issues with the byname *sundafyllir*. This byname was documented from Geirr Bassi (p. 28) as meaning 'sound-filler, able to fill a bay with fish by magic'.

This is a completely different epithet.

Submitter indicated on the original name change that the old name Metwynne Seonaid of Loch Lomand was to be released. All changes to the submission form were made prior to submission.

Submitted as Rannveig Snorriddottir, the name was changed to match the available documentation.

**Rannveig** is found as a feminine given name in Geirr Basse p 14.

**Snorri** is found as a masculine given name in Geirr Basse p.14. The patronymic is formed using the pattern on pg.17 which indicates that the correct form is Snorraddottir.

**Name Change is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Vlad Hideg** Resub Name Change and Device Change. Sable, a python glissant palewise Or wings displayed.

[Name] Vladimir Báthory registered January 1992 (via East)

Previous submission: **Vlad the Indifferent** was returned September 2004

No documentation was provided and none found of a Russian byname meaning "indifferent"; therefore this name cannot be registered under the lingua anglica allowance. Furthermore, by precedent, overly abstract English bynames of this sort are not registerable:

Niobe the Forgetful. [May 2002 LoAR Atlantia-R] "The byname the Forgetful has been registered a total of seven times, most recently in May 1994. Since that time, there have been several rulings regarding abstract descriptive bynames, including:

[returning the nickname the Arronious] Period nicknames tend to be straightforward and to use common words: Thynnewyt thin [of] wit, stupid, le Wis the wise, Badinteheved bad in the head, le Wilfulle, le Proude the proud, le Hardy the courageous, le Sour, le Cursed, le Deuyle the devil, Blaksoule black-soul. The learned erroneous simply doesn't belong in this company. Although the adjective in question is not a past participle, we do not consider this case to be significantly different from those of Adam the Unexpected (East, returned 2/96) and Deirdre the Distracted (Ansteorra, returned 4/94), whose bynames were returned partly for being too abstract. Similarly, erroneous is too far from the common tongue to be at all believable as a period byname. (Aurelius the Arronious of Bikeleswade, 10/96 p. 8)

The same argument applies to the byname *the Indifferent*.

The submitter desires a masculine name, will accept only minor changes, cares most about the meaning 'Indifferent' and desires a name that is authentic for Hungarian 15<sup>th</sup> century.

**Vlad** is found in Wickenden, p. 203 dated to 1424 and glossed as "to rule."

**Hideg** is found in Hungarian Names 101 by Walraven

(<http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/magyarnames1012.html#pot>) p. 4, under 'other kinds of Bynames: Hideg (cold, indifferent).

This name combines Russian and Hungarian, for which there is no precedent, but would likely be at most one step from period practice. We ask for the College's assistance in finding an authentic Hungarian name.

[Armory] Previously registered device: *Purple, on a chevron inverted between three boar's heads couped argent, one and two, three equal-armed celtic crosses sable*, is to be released.

This submission was already returned April 2004 for conflict with *Per saltire gules and sable, a python erect wings displayed Or*. (Jonathon Hawk, March of 1992.)

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel with a request for assistance.**

**Device is returned for conflict.**

**Summergate, Canton of**

**Bran mac Máeli Brigitte.** Release of device *Vert, three flames within a bordure rayonny Or*.

[Armory] Submitter's name was registered January 2000. Device: *Vert, three flames within a bordure rayonny Or* was registered January 2001.

**Release of Device is forwarded to Laurel**

**Darach, Shire of**

**Ghislaine de Lyon.** New Change of Holding Name.

[Name] The submitter desires in a feminine name. She will accept minor but not major changes. If the name must be changed she cares mores about the spelling and language/culture (12-13 century French).

Her holding name, Ghislaine of Calafia, was registered January 2002 via Caid when her device *Or, two continental panthers combattant sable maintaining between them a rose all within a bordure purple*, was registered.

Her previous submission, Ghislaine de Lyon, was returned on the January 2002 LoAR with the comment:

The submitter requested authenticity for 9th-11th C Norman and allowed minor changes. Additionally, on the Pennsic worksheet attached to her submission form, she requested that if the name could not be made authentic, that it be returned. Unfortunately, the LoI did not mention her request for authenticity, so the College was unable to contribute information to help make this name authentic. In an effort to provide the submitter with some information, Laurel staff members have assembled the following information: Morlet (I, p. 109) lists the forms *Gislindis* (undated) and *Gislinda* dated to a. 861. Morlet (I, p. 111) also lists *Gisloina* (undated). These may be earlier forms of *Ghislaine*, but we are not certain. Dauzat & Rostaing (s.n. Lyon) dates the Latin placename forms *Lodonum* to the 9th C, and (s.n. Lyons-la-Forêt) *nemus de Leonibus* to 1032, *saltus Leonis* to 1050, and *villa Leons* to 1067. In England, Reaney & Wilson (s.n. Lyon) dates *Azor de Lions* to 1159 and *Geoffrey de Lions* to 1170. As the only forms similar to *Ghislaine* were found in the 9th C, and the only form of *Lyon* found in that time period (*Lodonum*) is dramatically different from the submitted *Lyon*, changes to this form would be a major change to this name. As the submitter does not allow major changes, we are complying with her request to return the name if it could not be made authentic.

Her current submission states:

I did submit this name in the past, and the form read that I wanted my name accurate for the time period/location, and didn't allow changes, so I've been under a holding name of 6 years.

All I wish is that if the name can be put through without that stipulation, please do. I would however be interested in any suggestions on how to change my name in the future if I wanted it to be 100% accurate for the 12-13<sup>th</sup> Century.

Note: IGG contacted to let her know that we have changed to de Lyon. An older version of the name would be de Léon,

Submitted as Ghislaine du Lyon, was changed to match available documentation.

**Ghislaine** is grandfathered to the submitter.

**Lyon** is found in Dauzat, p. 401. s.n. Lyon "(originaire de Lyon) .

**de Lyon** is suggested in St. Gabriel Report 2940 as a plausible byname. - <http://www.panix.com/~gabriel/public-bin/showfinal.cgi/2904.txt>

**Name Change is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

#### Dreiburgen, Barony of

**Alienora of Richard's Castle.** New Name.

[Name] The submitter is interested in a feminine name. No other preferences are indicated.

**Alienora** is a feminine given name dated 1199-1213, 1297 in "Feminine Given Names in A Dictionary of English Surnames: Eleanor" by Talan Gwynek (<http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/talan/reaney/reaney.cgi?Eleanor>).

**Richard's Castle** was built c. 1051, <http://www.castles99.ukprint.com/essays/richards.html>.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Susanna Scholastica Seibold von Gettendorf.** Kingdom Resub Name and Kingdom Resub Device. *Purple, a dragon Or bellied argent and on a chief embattled argent a sword sable and rose vine entwined proper.*

[Name] The submitter desires a feminine name, will accept minor but not major changes. She cares most about the spelling of Seibold and the language/culture German.

**Susanna** is found in Aryanhwy merch Catmael's "German Names from 1495"

**Scholastica** is a saint: St. Scholastica whose Feastday is February 10, 543 St. Scholastica, sister of St. Benedict, consecrated her life to God from her earliest youth [http://www.catholic.org/saints/saint.php?saint\\_id=240](http://www.catholic.org/saints/saint.php?saint_id=240)

**Seibold** is found in Bahlow p 468 (UGer) = Sibold:Gisgald (bald, 'bold'); sh.f. Seibel, Beible. Also Seipold, Patri Seibolter (Aust.), Seubold, Seubel are Franc. Also related is the pl.n. Seibelsdorf in Bav.

**von** – generic 'of' in German.

**Gettendorf** is found in German Place Names from a 16<sup>th</sup> C Czech Register: Modern to medieval index by

Aryanhwy merch Catmael at <http://www.ellipsis.cx/~liana/names/german/modernperiod.html>

This name follows the pattern two given names, a byname and a locative, Late period German names of Catholics often had two given names – a birth name and a baptismal name.

**Name is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

**Device is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

#### Gallavally, Canton of

**Kale Angelina Lykaina.** New Name.

[Name] Submitted as Kale Angelina Lykaon; the name was changed to match the naming practices described in Chavez's article cited below. The submitter allows no changes **EXCEPT** dropping the middle name Angelina, wants a feminine name and does not allow a holding name (no armory submitted). When the submitter was contacted by Dolphin about changing the spelling to match the cited naming practices, she indicated that she was willing to accept this correction.

**Kale** is found listed as a feminine name dated to 952 in Personal Names of the Aristocracy in the Roman Empire During the Later Byzantine Era by Berret Chavez, Bardas Xiphias.

<http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/byzantine/introduction.html>. **Kale** is also found in the second edition (2006.2) of the database Prosopography of the Byzantine World, <http://www.pbw.kcl.ac.uk/pbw/apps/> dated to 1075.

**Angelina** is found as the middle of three name elements in the discussion on construction of women's name, and an example of the feminine form of Angelos, which is dated to 1110, in Personal Names of the Aristocracy in the Roman Empire During the Later Byzantine Era by Berret Chavez, Bardas Xiphias.

**Lykaina - Lykaon** is found in the name Nikephoros Lykaon dated to 1050 in: Prosopography of the Byzantine World, the second edition (2006.2) of the database project in December 2006: Prosopographical Reading of Byzantine Sources, 1025-1102, <http://www.pbw.kcl.ac.uk/pbw/apps/>

Per Chavez's article this masculine name would feminize to **Lykaina**.

Chavez gives examples of women's names with two, three, and five name elements, each element of which are feminized forms, which supports this name construction.

**Name is approved as changed and forwarded to Laurel.**

#### **Mons Draconis, Canton of**

**Qara Unegen.** Release of second primary name. *Bronwen Huntress*.

[Name] The name *Qara Unegen* was registered March 2000 via Caid. The name *Bronwen Huntress* was registered February 1992 via Atlantia along with her device, *Sable, a pall inverted wavy between three bear paw prints argent*. When *Qara Unegen* was forwarded to Laurel, the Caidan CoH failed to note that this was a name change, which was indicated on the form. The submitter has confirmed that she intended the name to be released. The device is to be associated with her new name, *Qara Unegen*.

#### **Dun Or, Barony of**

**Rayhana al-Hamra' al-Gharnatiyya.** Resub Laurel Name Change.

[Name] The submitter's name *Ianthe Delfini del Mare* was registered 08/94.

The previous submission, *Rana al-Gharnatiyya*, was returned on the October 2008 LoAR for lack of documentation of the given name.

The submitter desires a feminine name, and cares most about the sound, trying to keep it a close to "Rana" as possible. No other preferences are indicated.

**Rayhana** appears in the list of feminine isms in the same article at <http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/juliana/alandalus/femism.html>.

**al-Hamra'** The bynames *al-Hamra'* 'the red' and *al-Gharnatiyya* 'the Granadan' are constructed feminine forms.

The byname *al-Hamra'* may be found as a feminine byname constructed using the pattern of bynames based on color words in the masculine bynames section of Juliana's article, <http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/juliana/alandalus/mascnick.html>.

**al-Gharnatiyya** The same section contains the masculine locative byname *al-Garnati* 'from Granada'. The *Gh*-spelling is an alternate transliteration of the same underlying Arabic letter; the change from *al-Gharnati* to *al-Gharnatiyya* is required in order to make the byname feminine.

*Rayhana al-Hamra' al-Gharnatiyya* is a feminine Arabic name. The structure consists of an ism or given name together with two descriptive bynames. Juliana de Luna's article "Arabic Women's Names from al-Andalus" at <http://www.s-gabriel.org/names/juliana/alandalus/> notes that more than one byname may be found in formal written settings.

**Name Change is approved and forwarded to Laurel.**

#### **Gyldenholt, Barony of**

**Cynthia de Wickersham** Laurel Resub Alternate Name **Veny Smiðr**.

[Name] Registered April 1990.

Submitted as *Veny Smiðr*, the name was changed to match available documentation.

Previous submission of the alternate name *Vény Smiðsdóttír* was returned February 2006:

The byname does not follow a known naming pattern for Old Norse. The name *Smiðsdóttír*, meaning "daughter of the smith", creates a patronymic using an occupational term rather than a given name. This practice is

unattested in Old Norse. Barring documentation of patronymics formed using an occupational term or a nickname, such names cannot be registered. We would drop the *-dóttir* and register this as *Vény smiðr*, "Vény the smith", but the submitter will not accept major changes.

Submitter desires a feminine name, which is authentic for Viking/Norse and allows minor but not major changes.

[Name] The submitter's name was registered April 2008 via Caid.

[Armory] The submitter's previous device, *Per chevron ployé vert and argent, two dragons sejant respectant and a sprig of rosemary counterchanged* was returned by Crescent for a redraw as the emblazon originally submitted blurred the difference between per chevron and a point. This resubmission addresses that concern.

**Leonor Lestrange.** New Name and New Device. *Gules, a phoenix and a bordure denticulate Or.*

[Name] The submitter desires a feminine name, will accept minor but not major changes, and if the name must be changed, cares most about the Spanish language/culture.

**Leonor** is found listed as occurring 21 times in "Spanish Names from the Late 15<sup>th</sup> Century" by Juliana de Luna. <http://heraldry.sca.org/laurel/names/isabella/WomensGivenAlpha.html>

**Lestrange** is found in R&W on p. 430, s.n. Strange dated to 1192. L'Estrange is also found in Bardsley, p. 470 as header spelling, Nickname 'le Estrange' the stranger dated to 1273. Lestrange is found in Dauzat, p. 386 undated. This name appears to involve either a Spanish-English or a Spanish-French combination, either of which is a step from period practice.

[Device] This does not conflict with *Gules, a phoenix within a double tressure Or.* (Colin Tyndall de ffrayser, 09/97) and is also clear of *Gules, a Russian Firebird displayed Or, crested and its six tail feathers each charged with a heart, all azure* (Bogdan Borodets, 12/80), with CD's for the tressure and the tertiary hearts.

**Eleanor di Michelozzo Gianfigliuzzi.** New Name and New Device. *Per bend vert and Or, a lilac flower proper and in bend three lilac flowers palewise proper.*

[Name] The submitter desires a feminine name, cares most about the unspecified sound and the 15<sup>th</sup>-16<sup>th</sup> Century Italian language/culture. No other preferences are indicated.

**Eleanor** is found in "Feminine Given Names in A Dictionary of English Surnames," by Talen Gwenyk which cites Eleanor under Sudley dated to 1361.

**di** occurs in all but one of the nearly 260 names recorded in Aryanhwy's article Names from Arezzo, Italy, 1386-1528.

**Michelozzo** is found in Aryanhwy's article Names from Arezzo, Italy, 1386-1528 as a masculine given name.

**Gianfigliuzzi** is found in Aryanhwy's article Names from Arezzo, Italy, 1386-1528 as a surname.

This name follows the pattern gdf (given name, di, given name, family name), which is found in 28.7% of the names in Names from Arezzo, Italy, 1386-1528.

[Armory] This device must be returned because flowers are too complex to fimbriate, the fimbriation creates a situation of metal on metal in the lower half of the device, and the orientation of the flowers on the Or side need to all be the same. IGG has consulted with her highness and we expect a resubmission at a later meeting.

**Haru Matsunaga.** New Name and New Device. *Azure, on a roundel argent in bend sinister a dragonfly bendwise and a ginkgo leaf bendwise sinister.*

[Name] The submitter is interested in a feminine name. She will accept minor but not major names. If the name must be changed she cares most about the language/culture (Japanese).

**Haru,** is found in Solveig on p. 125 as a feminine name dated 1332 meaning "spring".

**Matsunaga** is found in Solveig on p. 158 as a surname meaning "forever" dated to approximately 1600.

The submitter notes that she would prefer Haruka but cannot find documentation.

The submitter would prefer the name Haruka, since the college was unable to find documentation, we are submitting

Haru Matsunaga Haru and request the college's assistance to find documentation for Haruka.

Name approved as Matsunaga Haru, and forwarded with a request for assistance in finding documentation closer to Haruka.

**Device returned for poor heraldic style and lack of identifiability of the ginkgo leaf.**

**Oniyama Ookami.** New Name and New Device. *Sable, on a plate a wolf statant ululant sable all within an annulet argent.*

**Oni** is documented from MCJC who suggests that it glosses as troll. The documentation says that it used as a name element in modern times.

**Ookami** is a constructed by name using elements found in MCJC. **Name returned for further consultation.**

**Device is returned for lack of a name.**

Qara Unengin appears to be a new name for Bronwen Huntress. "Bronwen Huntress see Qara Unegen". In the SCA Armorial, both names are registered, without an indication Bronwen was changed to Qara. The April 2000 LoAR and September 1999 CoH minutes fail to list this as a name change.
